#### Directions to Travis Pointe Country Club

Travis Pointe Country Club is located approximately four miles south of I-94. The Club is situated at 2829 Travis Pointe Road, which runs between Maple and Ann Arbor-Saline Roads. There are two entrances: the Maple Road entrance is gated and requires an opener, and the non-gated Ann Arbor-Saline Road entrance.

From I-94

1. Exit at exit 175—Ann Arbor-Saline Road.
2. Go south on Ann Arbor-Saline Road to the end of the road (approx four miles). There will be a three-way flashing stop sign at which you will turn left.
3. Go to the first set of lights (approx 300 yards). This is Travis Pointe Road. Turn left.
4. The clubhouse will be on the right-hand side.

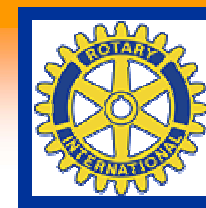

## PLANTING FOR CHILDHOOD SUCCESS

### Success By Six

The Rotary Club of Ann Arbor's newest Community Service project is to partner with **Washtenaw Success By Six**, an initiative of over fifty community groups coordinated by the Washtenaw Intermediate School District and the Washtenaw United Way. The group's mission is to make sure that all our children get the necessary support in their pre-school years to be able to succeed once they reach school.

The need is clear. Forty-six percent of kindergarten students enter school at risk for failure. Economically disadvantaged children enter kindergarten one to two years behind in language and other skills important to school success. By age five, children in high risk environments can already be two years behind developmentally; and this gap tends to persist over time.

Early learning is critical. Policies that seek to remedy deficits incurred in early years are much more costly than initial investments in the early years. When adults verbally interact with young children—talking, reading, singing and playing rhyming games—they build important foundations for learning to read. Nurturing, responsive and individualized interactions build healthy brains that provide a strong foundation for future growth and development.



#### **Five Key Target Areas:**

**Public Awareness**—working to raise the awareness of parents, caregivers, and all citizens about the importance of positive early childhood development.

**Healthcare Access**—working to ensure that young children receive preventative and ongoing healthcare.

**Professional Training and Skill Building**—working to improve the quality of childcare and early education in Washtenaw county.

**Parent Support**—working to help parents and caregivers gain the knowledge and skill for supportive and safe parenting.

**Resource Connection**—working to help parents, professionals and caregivers connect with services necessary for advancing supportive and safe parenting and ensuring quality childcare/early education.

## PLANTING TO KEEP ANN ARBOR GREEN

### Tree Replacement

The Rotary Club of Ann Arbor has joined the Ann Arbor City Forester to plant new trees to replace the city's ash trees lost to the Emerald Ash Borer. The epidemic caused by this unwelcome insect, discovered in this area in July 2002, will likely eliminate the ash population in the lower peninsula of Michigan before it is contained.



In Ann Arbor, roughly 15% of our trees are affected, and a majority of these are concentrated in certain neighborhoods thereby creating areas of complete devastation. The work to remove the dead or dying trees and plant new ones started in 2004 and is ongoing. The financial impact is severe with an estimated cost to do the entire job of \$5.0-\$7.5 million. Funds from several sources are being sought to cope with this unexpected budget crisis.



The project sponsored by The Rotary Club of Ann Arbor consists of raising funds and recruiting volunteers to plant replacement trees in city parks and along major thoroughfares. During the past five years our members, their families and other volunteers have logged over 300 hours to help plant over 1,300 trees in 23 Ann Arbor parks, and the Club contributed over \$110,000 for the purchase and planting of larger stock trees. Our project's scope may be small compared with the overall size of the problem; but if we all keep planting, our effort will make a significant difference in the beauty of our city.

## PLANTING FOR FUTURE SUCCESS

### Scholarships

The Rotary Club of Ann Arbor has always focused a major portion of its service work toward the community's youth. One aspect of this effort is to provide local high school seniors with college scholarships. The Club works with the administrators at all the local high schools to select worthy recipients based primarily on financial need. However, our sponsorship of Stone High School's STRIVE Program goes well beyond financial assistance in helping turn young lives around.



The typical student at Stone, referred to as Ann Arbor's "high school of last resort," has used up other education options without success. For those willing to apply themselves and change ineffective and/or destructive habits, STRIVE provides unique structure, incentives and motivation to earn a high school degree and an opportunity for higher education. To participate, students sign contracts at the start of their senior year promising to maintain 90% attendance, stay drug and alcohol free, and apply themselves academically. Performance is evaluated based on the improvement in the student's GPA over their senior year with the most improved students awarded scholarships to attend Washtenaw Community College. Rotary members work with the STRIVE participants in a number of ways both during their senior year and by mentoring the scholarship recipients after graduation.

Funds raised from this event will enable the Club to improve and expand all of its scholarship programs. Currently our Club funds these programs at approximately \$32,000 per year. However, there are many worthy candidates and college costs keep rising and there is much more to be done. Please join with us to help educate Ann Arbor's kids.
