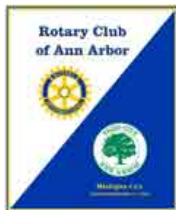

**2007 Rotary Community Allocations Grants** [submitted by Bill Dunifon]: Over 50 applications were received from community based not-for-profit organizations in the 2007 application cycle of the Community Allocations grant program. Once again, the theme guiding assessment of the applications was "Helping Kids Succeed".

Individual grants are made in amounts up to \$3000 based on an independent review of applications by members of the Community Allocations Committee. Individual numerical scores are then combined to determine the recipients. This year, 18 organizations will receive a total of approximately \$50,000 in support as a result of the generosity of the Rotary Club of Ann Arbor. They are:

**Reflections on the 2007 RI International Convention** [from President Al]: The 2007 RI International Convention "Rendezvous in the Rockies" proved to be everything I expected it to be... and even more! More than 17,000 Rotarians and guests from throughout the world convened in Salt Lake City in late June. All experienced nearly a full week of inspiring plenary sessions, helpful "nuts & bolts" workshops, and the joys of numerous concerts, special regional attractions, including the memorable performances of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir. So much happened! So much remembered! So much to share with you!



In this first of several planned reports to the Club, I strongly believe it best to highlight the poignant messages ---far too many to capture here--- from our RI leadership. Immediate past president Bill Boyd warmly inspired all to continue our work as "heroes" in our communities and throughout the world which is in keeping with the RI 2006-2007 theme year "Lead the Way". Speaking as though he was speaking to all in attendance on a one-to-one basis, he was especially congratulatory of our successes and continuing needed work in the areas of polio plus, literacy projects, and RI initiatives in promoting world peace and conflict resolutions. Incoming RI President Wilf Wilkinson shared

his visions which underscored the guiding principle for all of us that "sharing" is what Rotary is all about --- sharing freely of our time, our talents, resources, kindness and especially our love. Thus, the 2007-2008 RI theme of "Rotary Shares." Especially stimulating to all were his emphases on health, literacy, water, and the needed expansion of the Rotary family by welcoming qualified new members into existing and newer clubs. Always with an engaging and infectious enthusiasm, President Wilf's heartfelt messages reminded us all that when there is a new idea for a service project in our community or globally; an indelible will to serve; and a unswerving commitment to serve --- that combination can and will lead to further successes in the full spirit of Rotary.

Fellow Rotarians, I look forward to "sharing" with you other of my 2007 RI convention experiences--- dealing next with "lessons learned". **A Few Words from President Wilf** [from the July issue of *Rotary World*]: Wilfrid J. Wilkinson, 2007-08 RI president, has launched the new Rotary year as the year to “say yes to Rotary.” The RI theme, Rotary Shares, is a reflection of his commitment to share Rotary with others through service and recruiting new members.

Wilkinson, a member of the Rotary Club of Trenton, Ontario, Canada, sees the concept of sharing as a motivating force behind Rotary work. “In choosing this theme, I thought about how much of Rotary is about sharing. We share our time, we share our talents, we share our money with others who need our help,” he told incoming district governors at the 2007 International Assembly in February.

“In Rotary, sharing doesn’t mean giving away what you have to spare, what you don’t need for yourself,” he explained. “Sharing means giving of yourself, selflessly, for the good of others.”

Wilkinson has chosen to continue immediate past president Bill Boyd’s emphases of water, health and hunger, literacy, and family of Rotary. “These basic needs have been at the forefront of Rotary’s efforts for several years now,” he says. “And I hope that they will continue, because with clean water, good health, and the ability to read and write, so many of the people who need help will find the ability to help themselves.”

In a time of dwindling participation in service organizations worldwide, Wilkinson emphasizes the importance of commitment to membership expansion. “It’s not always an easy thing to invite someone into Rotary. Too often, we hear no. And no one likes to hear no. It’s easy to get discouraged. But you have to expect those no’s, and know when to ask again — and when to move on to find a yes somewhere else.”

Equally important to Rotary’s future, says Wilkinson, is attention to programs for youth. “Working to strengthen our programs for youth helps ensure a new generation of responsible, ethical, and volunteer-minded people. [They] are our link to the future of Rotary which we ourselves will not see.”

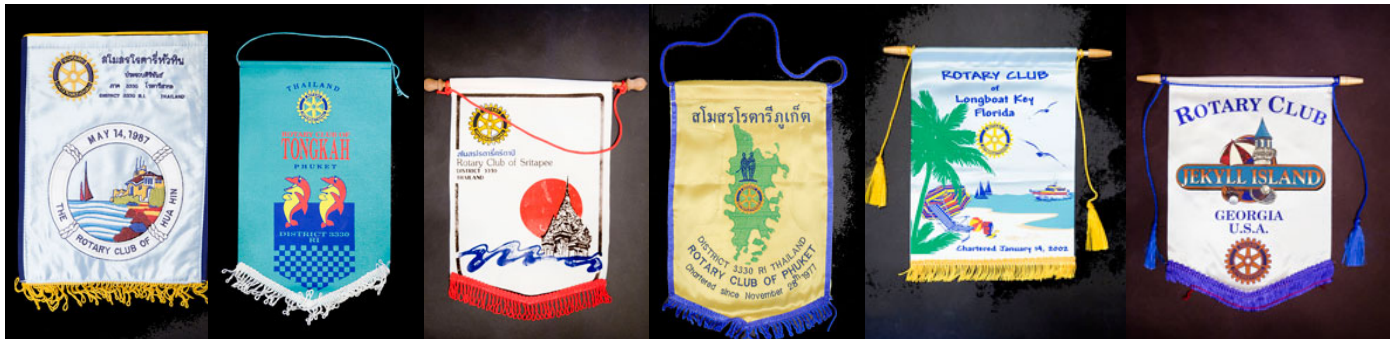
